In March this year, one of our teachers, Ms Jane Leung (JL) and two students, Andy Lai (AL) and Johnson Wan (JW), both from 4A, took part in the 'Blue Skies Poem Writing Competition', organised by the HKSAR government. We are so happy because Ms Leung won the competition and both Andy and Johnson achieved merits. Because of this, I thought it would be interesting to interview them.

Congratulations to all of you! Thank you for sparing the time for this interview. Would you mind telling me about the 'Blue Skies Poem Writing Competition'?

JL : Yes, of course. The aim of the competition is to promote the program of Blue Skies through poems.

I : What was your feeling after winning these awards?

JL : I felt very excited. I think this honour is not just for me. It is for all my students. I would like to share this award with my students. I like writing poems. I think writing poetry helps me to express my feelings and share my mood with my students. I think that is more important than receiving an award.

AL : I think it is very special. I couldn't believe that I got this award. Writing a poem was a special experience for me.

JW: I felt very surprised to win this award. It was the first time I had written a poem and I got an award. I am not good at Chinese. So, I was really very surprised. But I can learn one thing from this competition which is, if you use your heart to do something, you will find success at the end.

We were well coordinated and, therefore, worked efficiently and effectively. All in all, communication and consideration are important since they are key factors to success and we all had a wonderful time.

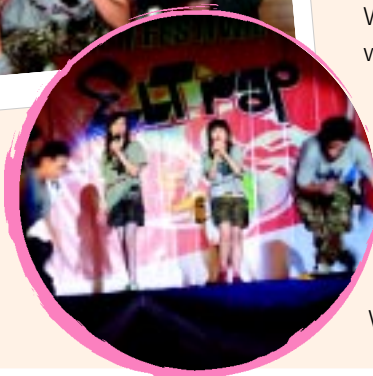

New Zealand: An Ideal Eco-tour Destination

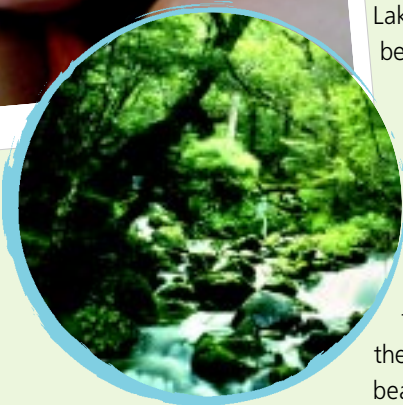

New Zealand is a country in the south-western Pacific Ocean consisting of two large islands and many smaller islands. There are different scenic spots which are famous all over the world. All the scenic spots are made by mother nature. The NZ government is very active in protecting all these places. I will talk about some of the wonderful scenic spots in New Zealand.

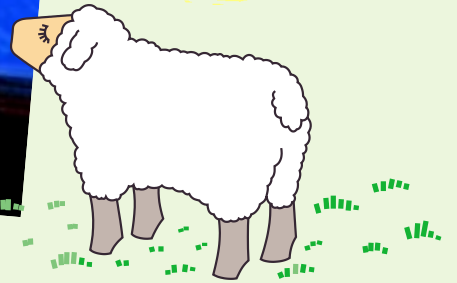
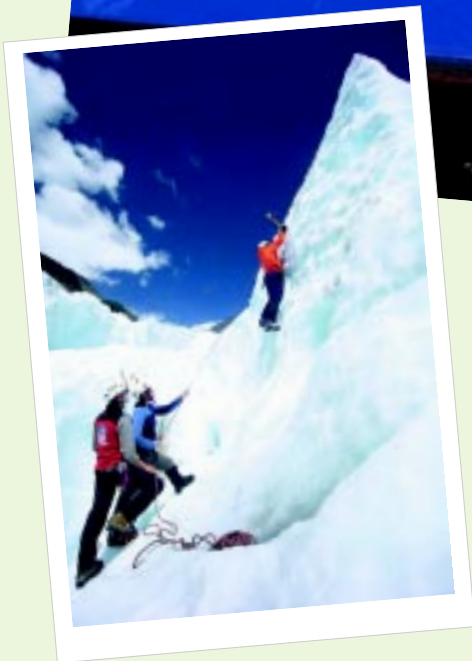
Firstly, let's talk about the Fox Glacier. Its height is 2600m. The length of Fox Glacier is about 13km, and its depth is about 300m. The flowing speed of Fox Glacier is slow. The glacier is very steep and provides a good activity for the people who like to take a risk. People can walk on the glacier, or choose to climb up to the iceberg. Near Fox Glacier is a beautiful lake called Lake Matheson. It reflects the highest mountain in New Zealand. The mountain is called Mt. Cook. The height of Mt. Cook is 3764m. It is in an area named 'The Alps in the Southern Hemisphere'. There are 18 mountains in the surrounding area. All of them are above 3000m. Mt. Cook is a great place for hiking. From November to February, the weather is comfortable, and flowers blossom.

Lake Watatipu is the most beautiful spot in Queenstown. (This is where LKY students will be staying). The lake's length is 84km. The fluctuations of the water levels are quite frequent. The water level rises and falls every 6 minutes. It is the most amazing characteristic of Lake Watatipu. The most attractive activity is to travel by steamer 'TSS Earnslaw' along Lake Watatipu. This steamer is the only one in the Southern Hemisphere.

Finally, I would like to talk about Waitomo Cave near Rotorua. The cave is an extraordinary sight. It is full of fireflies. There are about ten million fireflies in the cave and it really is a grand sight when they all light up. New Zealand possesses exceptionally beautiful natural landforms. Eco-tours remind us of the importance of protecting mother nature. When you are enjoying the beauty of nature, remember to protect it.

Earlier this year we had a poetry writing competition for form 1 and 2 students. Here is one of the winning entries, written by Chiu Ka Chun of 1E.

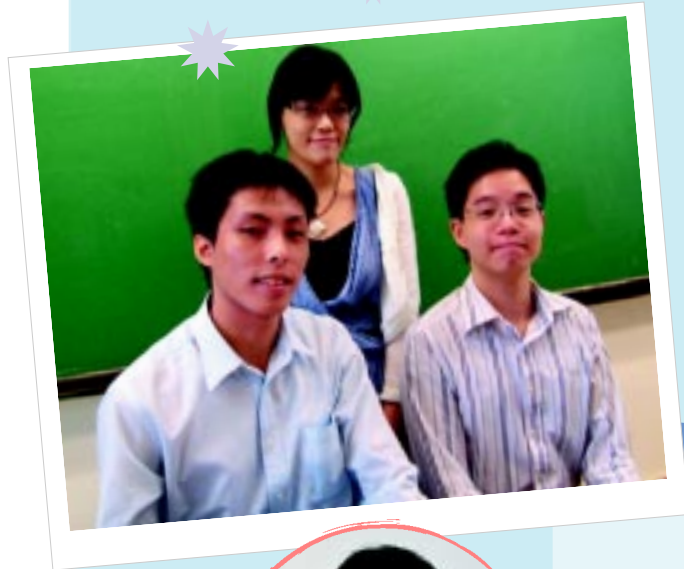
HKSAR Establishment Day

N : Oh, that sounds quite an interesting experience!

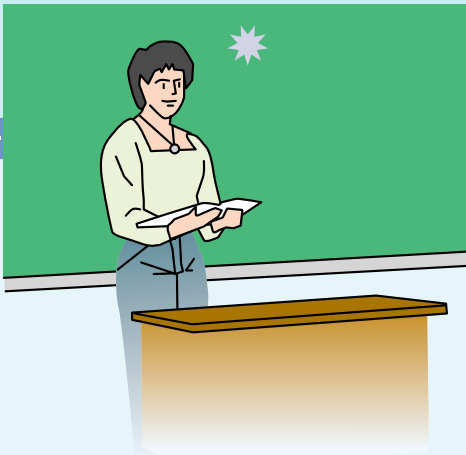
M : Mr. Yu, you are also one of the new teachers in our school this year. So, what made you interested in teaching here?

The New English Exam:

A Message from **Form 5 Students**

This year students sat for the new English exam. Sitting for exams is always stressful but being the first group of students to sit for an exam is doubly stressful. However, most students feel that the exam wasn't so bad after all. Below are the comments of three LKY students who took the exam, with some advice for Form 4 students.

This year (2007) is the first year students sat for the new English exam. It is completely different to the old exam.

I think SBA is an easy way to get high marks in the CE exam. This is because we can choose a book we're interested in and if we spend a lot of time on preparation, we are sure to get a great mark.

Paper 1A (Reading) is not as hard as we think. The most difficult thing is to control the timing. An hour is not really enough time to read three texts.

Paper 2 is the composition paper. It has two parts. In Part A, we have to write about 100 words. It is very easy and the topics are simple. The problem is part B, for which we have to write 250 words. We have to decide which topic is suitable for us and give our point of view. It is important to concentrate because the time runs out fast.

The Listening paper is never a problem. It's easy to get full marks in tasks 1, 2, 3 and 4. The main points are repeated and the speaker spells out any difficult words for you. In Tasks 5 and 6 you need to find and copy down key information.

Be confident! Next year will be your CE exam. English is easy if you spend time doing your work now. Whether it's a new syllabus or not, English will be useful all your life. Study hard, my schoolmates and start now!

In my opinion, SBA is a good policy to estimate the English level of students. Before this change, the exam could not estimate the English level of students in depth.

Paper 1A, the reading exam, is combined with Paper 1B. This is good for all students because it reduces the level of stress faced by students.

The writing test is the most important part for estimating students' language level.

In Paper 2, the listening test, students have to gather a lot of information from the recordings and the passage. This really tests a student's ability to organise work carefully.

I think the new syllabus is good for all students because it can teach us how to overcome challenges we may face in the future.

SBA focuses more on your speaking and communication skills, which I think is a really good idea. It encourages us to read more books and offers more chances for us to speak English. Without a doubt, it is useful and helpful for us. In addition, it also improves other aspects of English because to get high marks, you need to read many books. So, not only will you learn more vocabulary and grammar, but also through reading books, you will learn about the cultures of other countries.

In my opinion, the Reading Paper (1A) is much easier than Syllabus A and B. The exam paper was even easier than our practice papers during lessons or homework. However, there are about 50 questions based on the given texts, so you need to control the time properly and do each text carefully.

In general, the writing exam (Paper 1B) is much more difficult than Syllabus A. This is because you need to do two different tasks. It is a big problem for someone who is weak in English. However, it should not be a problem for you because you still have time. Try to read more books this year.

I think the Listening Paper is quite easy. However, in this paper, spelling is very important, so you must try your best and not make any silly mistakes. I know some of you may be very worried about the new English Exam, just like I was before. But don't be worried about it. I was in the first group to take the new exam, so perhaps I can give you some tips. In Paper (1A), you should read the title of the text first, guess the stance of the writer and what the text may be about. In the Writing Paper (1B), task 1 is much easier than task 2, so don't spend a lot of time on it. It just needs about 15 minutes. Task 2 is difficult, so you should plan first before writing. For the listening paper, before you listen, read the situation carefully. It will help you complete the exam. While listening, you should spot the key words in the questions as this will help you fill in the answers. More importantly, try to make an attempt to learn more English this year. This will improve your chance of success!

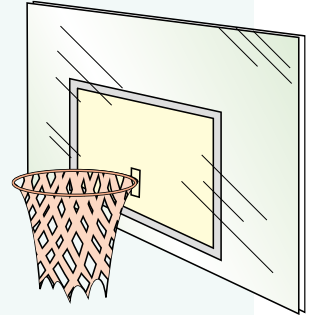

Getting along with students

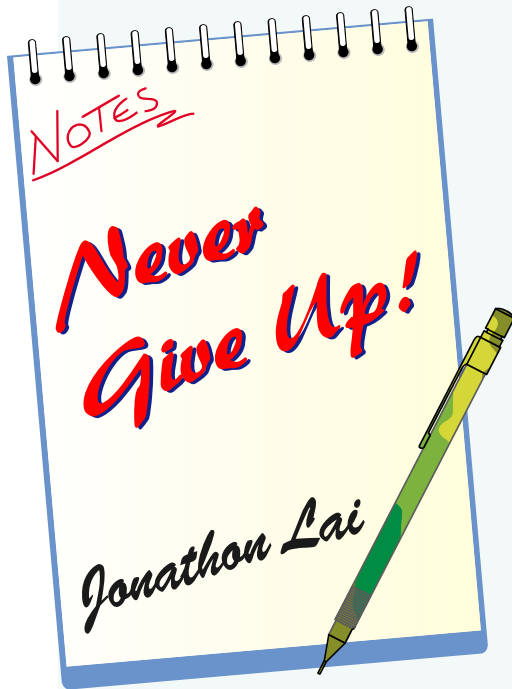
I am interested in knowing what students like to do, what they think and what they want. Doing the things I do provides a channel for me to understand them. It's true that there is a huge generation gap between the students and me. We have different family backgrounds, education and life experience. But that mustn't stop me getting to know them, to understand them. Mutual understanding of the school management and student body is the key to developing students' trust, love and a strong sense of belonging to the school.



Relationships with staff

It is important to treat people around you nicely and sincerely. Bearing in mind there are more than 80 staff members working together, I have to handle colleagues carefully. Being fair and treating everyone equally is the key. One thing I hate most is rumours as they can do lots of harm to the school and people around you. Speaking in Public

Be confident and don't feel shy. Accept that we may make mistakes or use the wrong words when speaking in front of an audience. Everybody makes mistakes. Don't let it spoil your speech. The other thing is content. A good speech involves meaningful and inspirational content. Don't give an empty talk. I carry a notebook and jot down good quotes, good ideas and encouraging mottos and even slogans. They are always useful in preparing my own speeches. I notice that many of my students have good potential in public speaking but they are too shy.
