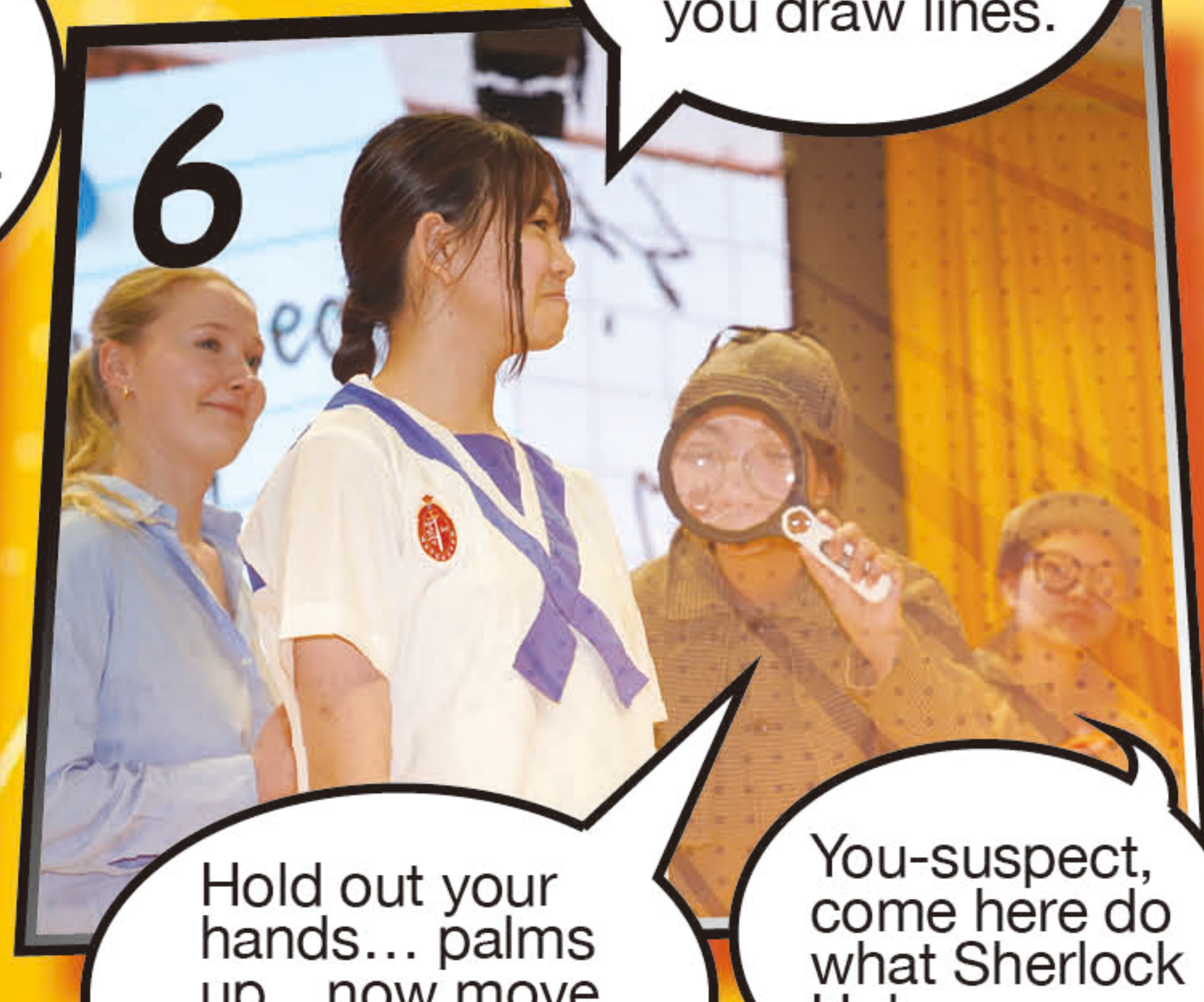

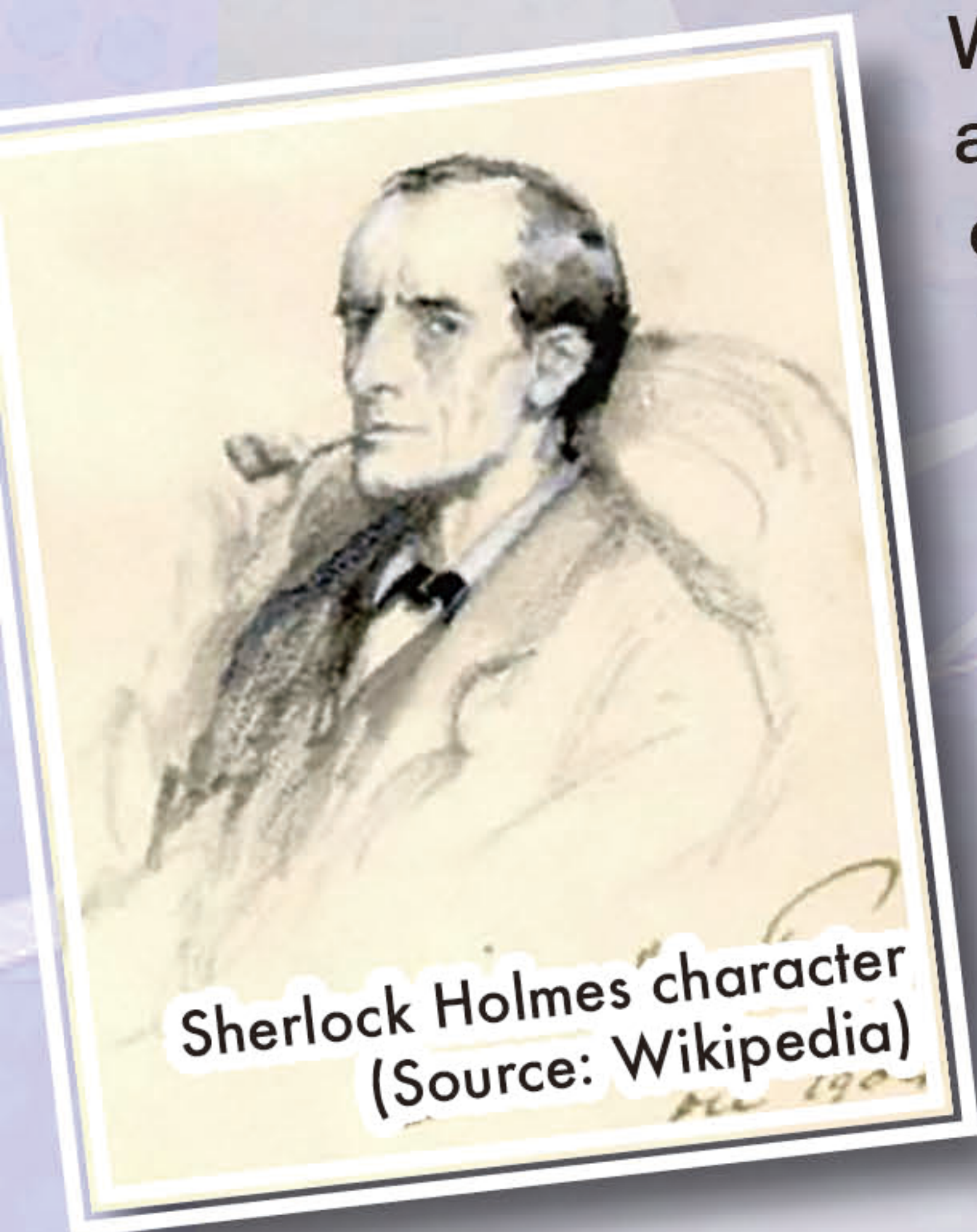


Finding Success in What You Love

I believe detectives should always prioritise evidence rather than rely solely on instincts. This is because evidence is objective, verifiable and legally admissible, while instincts are subjective and prone to bias. For example, DNA samples, fingerprints or surveillance footage can prove a suspect's involvement in a crime, whereas a detective's 'gut feeling' cannot be used in court. Also, depending only on instincts risks wrongful convictions and undermines public trust in the justice system. Evidence ensures fairness and accountability. For instance, there have been cases where suspects were wrongly accused based on behaviour or intuition but later exonerated when new evidence, such as DNA testing, proved their innocence. Therefore, while instincts may guide detectives toward leads, evidence must always be the foundation of investigations and the ultimate basis for justice.

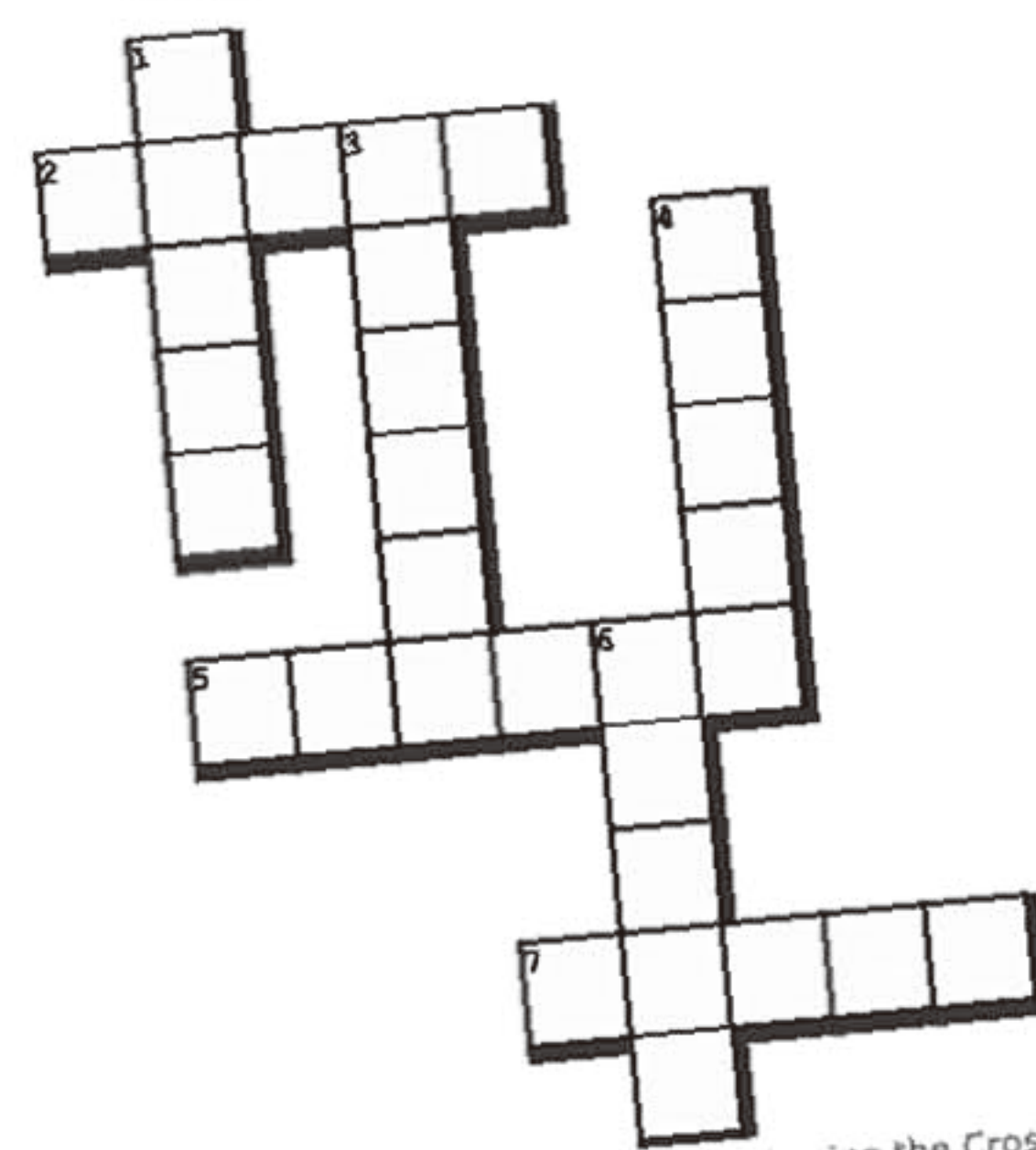

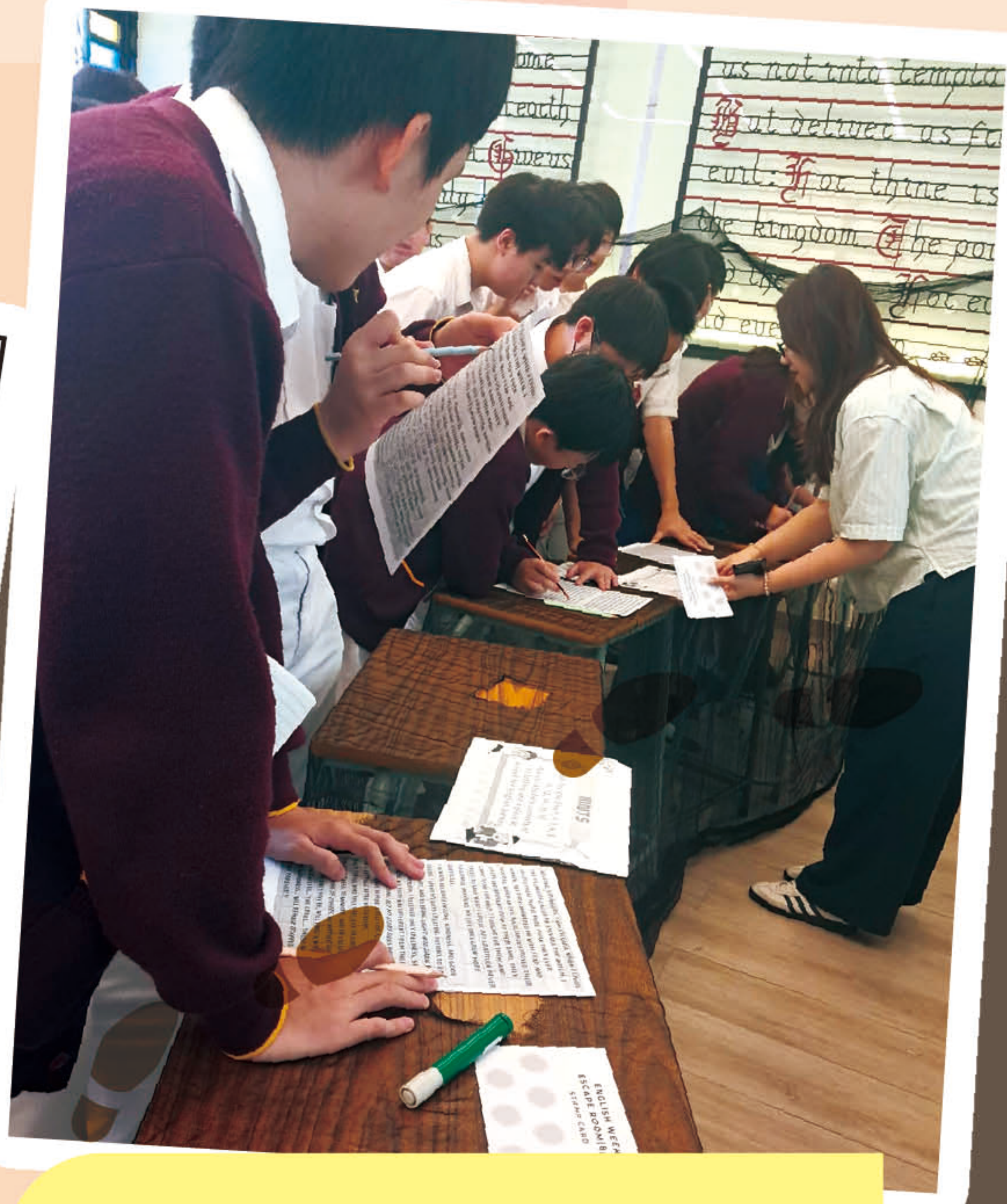
